There's a lot of work to do in today's world. Almost daily, the TV and Radio brings terrible news of

atrocities and disasters around the planet. It's easy to feel overwhelmed by all the bad news and to feel powerless to do anything. We do not consider that we can individually instigate change for lots of reasons. We do not feel clever enough, or brave enough or rich enough. Poverty, mathematician Eli Khamarov said, is like punishment for a crime you didn't commit. Dictatorial and corrupt governments can make what could be a very rich nation into a poor one. And so does a history



of exploitative colonization, weak rule of law, war and social unrest, severe climate conditions or hostile, aggressive neighbours. It is often hard to pinpoint a single cause of long-term poverty, hence why economists often refer to "cycles" of poverty. For example, a country in debt will not be able to afford good schools, and a poorly educated workforce will be less capable of fixing problems and creating conditions that will attract foreign investment.

This month we are invited to share in Pope Francis's prayer intention "...that those in charge of finance will work with governments to regulate the financial sphere and protect citizens from its dangers."

Global Prayer Marathon for the Month of May




Pope Francis has called for a global prayer marathon for the entire month of May, praying for the end to the pandemic.



The True Vine

"I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." John 15:5

To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears.



A much brighter Tomorrow

Mary Robinson has joined more than 150 former heads of state and Nobel laureates in signing an open letter to US president Joe Biden calling for a "people's vaccine" to end the pandemic. India and South Africa have led the campaign, which calls for intellectual property rights on Covid-19 vaccines to be waived so that production can be ramped up globally. The Biden Administration is said to be considering a temporary waiver of World Trade Organisation (WTO) intellectual property rules during the pandemic. Former president Dr Robinson has supported the campaign, and has also called on EU leaders to "put the collective right to safety for all ahead of everything else - and come together to end this pandemic." The letter to Mr Biden says the waiver will "save lives and advance us towards global herd immunity." It states: "These actions would expand global manufacturing capacity, unhindered by industry monopolies that are driving the dire supply shortages blocking vaccine access. "Nine in 10 people in most poor countries may well go without a vaccine this year. "At this pace, many nations will be left waiting until at least 2024 to achieve mass Covid-19 immunisation." The poor suffer most in this pandemic, that's why a just and equitable distribution of vaccines is so important.


Nationally over the last year the news has developed its own irreversible template:

- (i) Government and NPHET representatives are invariably asked - When will X, Y or Z be happening?
- (ii) The response is usually We can't be specific because we don't know what the science will be telling us at that point.
- (iii) But people need clarity and there's a breakdown in communication because they are not getting clarity.
- science will be telling us at that point.

Acres of print and forests of trees have been sacrificed repeating that same inter-change in different ways. Exactly the same template is followed by politicians those interested in getting into power but haven't the responsibility of high office at present and those who don't want to get into office and have the added luxury of building even bigger castles in the air. For both, it's about getting on television and invariably the sequence follows the above (i), (ii) (iii) and (iv).

For the first lockdown, there was a certain novelty. We started baking, painting or testing out our green fingers in the garden. Then the flour and the paint ran out. Or we started walking. Or phoning relatives and friends exchanging experiences and worries about adjusting to the 5K limit. After a while we realised that no one had any news because no one was going anywhere, no one was doing anything or meeting anyone. And if we happened to meet someone, that person had no news because they were going nowhere and meeting nobody.

So the same stilted conversation was about wondering



how long the lockdown would last, when a vaccine would be available, when schools would open, when essential services like barbers would be back. And the unchanging response was (ii) (above) We can't be specific because we don't know what the science will be telling us at that point. Even planning for the future became a nightmare. Almost everything had to be cancelled or postponed - holidays, weddings, Christmas, evenings out, weekends away - and even if they hadn't, COVID-19 became the unquestioned excuse to put anything vaguely uncomfortable on the long finger. All that was reasonably possible was to grow hair and to expand the figure as the high-points of the day became breakfast, dinner and tea and even passing the fridge seemed beyond what the human condition could reasonably expect. A second lockdown came and went as did Christmas and, as I write, a third lockdown is still in place. See (i), (ii) (iii) above.

But it's different now. The sky is clear and the sun is shining. Numbers contracting the virus are steadily going (iv) We can't be specific because we don't know what the down, deaths are decreasing, numbers in hospital and in intensive care have declined, vaccines, despite the ups and downs of distribution, are being rolled out in huge numbers and their effect will soon be felt. Suddenly, we have so much to look forward to. Visiting family members. Meeting friends for a coffee. Going out for the day. Soon the GAA football championship will be underway. Golf courses are open. Hairdressers will clip away to their hearts' content. The breeze will carry the hum of children playing in a distant school-yard. Simple, everyday activities and pleasures that took COVID-19 to remind us about how pivotal to our happiness the ordinary bits of life can be.

Bicentenary of the Birth of John Canon O'Hanlon

This weekend marks a significant event for Co. Laois – the bicentenary of the birth of John Canon O'Hanlon in Stradbally on 30 April, 1821 – a man who stands out as one of the greatest achievers that this county has ever produced. Not only was he an outstanding priest who was elevated to the status of Canon in the Archdiocese of Dublin, but he was a noted writer, historian, folklorist and promoter of the Irish language.

His most famous work, *Lives of the Irish Saints*, was published in ten volumes between 1873 and 1905. This painstaking work involved in-depth research of the lives of Ireland's saints. It opened a unique window on Christianity in Ireland and on the people who shaped it. For example, in Volume 2 concerning the month of February, we see twenty-five pages dedicated to the life of St. Fintan of Clonenagh and Cromogue. Not only do these pages contain a comprehensive account of St. Fintan's life but O'Hanlon also produced sketches of places of local interest in the story of St. Fintan's life such as the site of Churchfield Cemetery at Clonkeen, the ruined church of Clonenagh, the old church at Cromogue, and the then 'new' Catholic Church of St. Fintan at Mountrath – many of which were drawn by O'Hanlon himself in the 1850s and 1870s. Some of the most fascinating aspects of O'Hanlon's accounts of the lives of the saints can be found in the footnotes such as his description of the well that sprung from what is known locally at the 'money tree' in Clonenagh: "Many of the peasantry, to the present day, when passing the well of St. Fintan at Clonenagh, take off their hats, and make a sign of the cross on their forehead – the women also make a curtesy – customs which the writer had opportunities for witnessing (in August 1856)."

Amongst the other published works of O'Hanlon (twenty-eight in total, three of which were published after his death), were several other works with a religious theme such as "The Life of St. Brigid," "The Life of Saint David (chief patron of Wales)," "The Life of St. Laurence O'Toole, Archbishop of Dublin," and "The Life of St. Aengus the Culdee, bishop and abbot at Clonenagh and Dysartenos."

Here in Co. Laois O'Hanlon is renowned for his "History of the Queen's County" which was published in two volumes in 1907 and 1914, both after his death. These are important and significant reference books for those interested in the history of this county from earliest times up to the end of the nineteenth century. Another important work from a local perspective was O'Hanlon's research, in the latter part of his life, of the writings of the writer and poet, John Keegan of Killeaney near Shanahoe. This culminated in the publication in 1907 of "Legends and Poems by John Keegan" — a work that was finalised two years after O'Hanlon's death by D.J. O'Donoghue. A letter from O'Hanlon to O'Donoghue in September 1901 gives an interesting account of his ongoing work on the Keegan project: "I hope to go down for a few days before winter sets in to Abbeyleix, and see some of the Campions living there.... A young gentleman, Hibernian Bank clerk, a Mr. O'Toole and a good amateur photographer, has promised to take photographs for me of the site of the house in which his uncle Maloney and he first taught school, afterwards transferred to Shanahoe Chapel, of Killeaney Castle, of Gortnaclea Castle, of Poor Man's Bridge, and other places alluded to by him. Several are yet living that remember him and loved him in life, but they are old like myself, and therefore no time ought to be lost, as my friend Mr. Edward Morrissey is most anxious to aid my investigations and drive me out to the scenes so familiar to poor Keegan."

The Morrissey name is, of course, synonymous with Abbeyleix and they were part of O'Hanlon's extended family. As well as regular visits by O'Hanlon to Abbeyleix, letter-writing between them was frequent such as a letter addressed by O'Hanlon from Star of the Sea Church, Irishtown, Dublin to "Mrs. Mary Morrissey, Hotel, Abbeyleix" on December 21st 1901 which opened with the following lines: "I have to thank you very cordially for the Christmas presents of the fine turkey and brace of partridges that arrived this evening, and to wish Mr. Morrissey, yourself and numerous family a very happy meeting around the festive board. I have specially to request you will allow Teresa to come up to Dublin on Monday week for her holydays, especially as I shall have a small party of young people to have an early lunch on New Year's Day, Wednesday, so that we may adjourn to our school-house at 8 o'clock, where we are to have a very enjoyable scóraíocht, Irish songs, Irish music, Union Pipers, Violin and Irish lecture, combined, first rate talented ladies and gentlemen to take part. Then she is to remain at least into the month of February when I promise to return with her to Abbeyleix for a couple of days when I hope to trespass on Mr. Morrissey's valuable time to glean more particulars of John Keegan as I hope to do.....For the last week I have not been in bed before one o'clock – once before three o'clock – in the morning, working on the Index of my Irish American History of the United States."

When John Canon O'Hanlon, Parish Priest of the parish of Sandymount in Dublin died in May 1905 his funeral to Glasnevin Cemetery was attended by many from Co. Laois (then Queen's County) and they included James A. Mulhall of Pass House, Ballyroan, E.J. Morrissey of Abbeyleix as well as P.A. 
